A Word from your Pastor

Over the years, I have attended many seminars on the topic of parish stewardship and administration where various presentations regarding the financial details of parish life were given. While each one was unique, they all shared a common thread. Specifically, they emphasized an approach to fundraising that is commonly used by professional fundraising consultants. Their pitch was that a successful stewardship program can only happen when each family is visited by a stewardship committee and urged to give a significant donation for the following year. They also usually mention how important it is to focus on the wealthiest parishioners to get the best results.

My frustration with these seminars has grown to the point where I refuse to attend them any more. Even when I would offer another approach to stewardship and administration during the question and answer periods, my ideas were usually dismissed as being invalid.

Consequently, what I would like to do this month is to discuss in general terms, the approach we have taken here at Saint Katherine over the past 23 years when it comes to stewardship giving and parish administration. It is a unique approach, to be sure, but I believe it has produced some tangible results.

We start by saying that everyone is encouraged to offer what they are able to each year, to ensure that God's work continues to be done through our parish. We also like to suggest that all families consider dedicating at least one dollar each day for God. Over the years we have seen stewardship giving ranging from a very minimal amount to over \$10,000 for the year from various families. But regardless of the amount anyone may offer to support the work of Saint Katherine, we make sure that everyone is treated the same. All families are treated with love and respect no matter how much they give.

The second key point to our approach to stewardship is this: people give money to support the church in the same way that they give money for anything else...when they know that their giving has value. Nobody, not even a millionaire, likes to waste

money. If parishioners see results from their giving, they will continue to support a parish. If it doesn't seem like their money is producing something of value, or if it seems that their donations are not being used wisely, they'll stop. It's that simple. Guilt never produces anything of lasting value. Trying to force someone to make a stewardship offering by making them feel guilty simply doesn't work in the long term.

But people will respond if they see that the focus of a parish is solidly on God and that lives are being changed, either directly or indirectly, by the work that goes on in that parish. When it comes to the church experience, deep down everyone asks the same questions: Is the worship spiritually inspiring and offered with dignity? Is the sermon relevant to today's life while staying true to scripture and Orthodox teaching? Does the behavior of the people in the congregation reflect the Christian values that the Church teaches? Is the community a welcoming one? Are there activities offered that serve to reinforce the values of the parish? Is there a sense of joy present in the parish?

The answers each of us has to those questions will in large part determine the amount of support we are willing to offer our parish. After that, each of us looks to determine whether donations are being used wisely. And that brings us to the subject of our parish administration.

We started 23 years ago with very humble beginnings in a warehouse and just a handful of people. And believe it or not, we have the same structure of parish administration now with 300 families as we did then – Father Dino and volunteers. As a matter of fact, I can't really think of any other parishes our size that don't have at least a secretary or administrator or something. But, we don't. It's just me and a lot of very helpful members of the parish that enthusiastically step forward time and time again to do all sorts of things to keep our Saint Katherine parish going...secretarial duties, maintenance duties, and all sorts of other things.

We may not get everything done immediately but things do get done. And that spirit of helping spills over even to our parish organizations and activities. The result is that many of us have developed a sense of ownership and belonging to Saint Katherine and its ministries. Whether it is with our youth programs or charitable work or fundraising efforts, I have seen a beautiful trend of involvement develop with so many families over the years that I can't help but thank God for His goodness and blessings.

And that brings me to my final point about our stewardship and administrative approach here at Saint Katherine: Many churches try the newest trends in parish organization, but I have found that only God can renew and invigorate a community. If we stay close to Him, He'll be close to us and bless us over and over again with progress and spiritual growth.

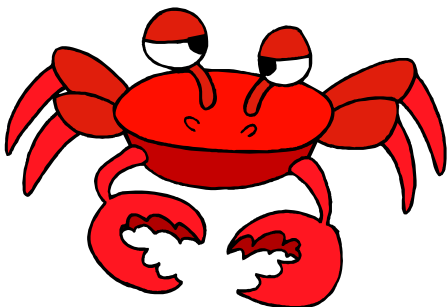

Orthodox Memorial Services

Set me as a seal upon your heart; for love is as strong as death. (Song of Songs 8:6)

Prayer for the dead is seen by Orthodox Christians as an essential component of our faith in Jesus Christ. Praying for those who have died is not merely an expression of mourning, it is a proclamation that Christ has risen from the dead and that, in His love, even death cannot separate us from one another! Forty days after the death of a loved one (or on the Sunday nearest to the 40 days), it is the custom of our Church to celebrate a prayer service in remembrance of the deceased known in English as a Memorial Service. In this service we ask God to “grant rest” to the deceased “in the bosom of Abraham” (Luke 16:22-23) and to place him or her “in a place of light, a place of happiness, a place of refreshment, where there is no pain, no sorrow and no suffering” (Revelation 21:4) as we did during the funeral service.

A tray of boiled wheat, raisins and powdered sugar called “*kolyva*” in Greek is prepared for the service and is later, at the parish coffee hour, distributed to the community. This practice is based on the words that the Lord Jesus used to describe His own death and resurrection, “Amen, I say to you: unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains a single grain of wheat. But if it dies, it brings forth a good harvest” (John 12:24). The tray of *kolyva* is a symbol of our faith in the life-giving death and resurrection of Christ.

“For if we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord.

So then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord’s.” (Romans 14:8)
