I would like to take this opportunity to let you know how overwhelmed I was on June 30th during the celebration of the 25th anniversary of my ordination to the holy Priesthood. It was for me, a wonderful day filled with one blessing after another.

His Eminence, Metropolitan Gerasimos celebrated a beautiful Liturgy that morning together with eight Priests from the area and a deacon, as well as some beautiful chanting by the Principle Chanter of the San Francisco Metropolis. I was also amazed to see that over 250 faithful parishioners and friends came to worship that Wednesday morning from all over the valley.

Then afterward, everyone gathered in our hall for a delicious luncheon where messages from the Governor, the Speaker of the Assembly, two state Senators and the Mayor of Elk Grove were read. Most important, however, were the messages from our Parish Council and Philoptochos, and especially the warm and personal words of congratulations from His Eminence.

And if that weren't enough, it was announced that the Saint Katherine community, in honor of my 25 years of service as a Priest, had decided to send me on a pilgrimage to visit the monastery of Saint Katherine at Mount Sinai in Egypt and that the Pilgrimage should include a visit to Constantinople to see the Hagia Sophia Cathedral there. The formal presentation of that gift will take place on Sunday, August 1st, during a reception at the coffee hour following the Divine Liturgy.

Can you see how a person can become overwhelmed?

It has been a joy for me to have spent most of my 25 years as a Priest here with all of you in Elk Grove. It also speaks volumes for the Saint Katherine community to express itself the way it did on June 30th. With your kindness and generosity, you have shown not only me, but also His Eminence and by extension, all the parishes on the West Coast, the regard you have for my ministry and service here at Saint Katherine.

Freedom From Sin

An Interview with Father Paylos

Dikaios of the Saint Katherine Monastery on Mount Sinai

Father Pavlos: To us, freedom chiefly means for someone to become freed from the passions, from sin. Because if someone lives in an environment that has full freedom, such as America, where real freedom exists, but he is enslaved by the passions in sin, that person is not really free. He is a slave of the passions. In our church, there is a great emphasis on the need for us to become freed from the passions. It is the greatest servitude, the heaviest servitude, to be a slave of the passions. If we as persons shall become freed from the passions, from sin, then we will live in true freedom, in whatever environment we find ourselves.

Question: What is the difference between a passion and a sin?

Father Pavlos: It's the same thing, but the passion is something that has greater hold on you in terms of time. Sin is something we do once, but the passion is a condition that has become permanent within us.

Question: A sin we do many times?

Father Pavlos: Yes, it continues. In America, it is usual to use the word "passion" to praise someone; we say someone has a "passion for music," for instance. We consider it a good thing to have a passion. We even use this method of speech to identify ourselves – "his passion is cooking." Yes, in Greece too that's common. It is something excessive; one loves something to the extreme.

Question: Then how is a good passion distinguished from a bad one?

Father Pavlos: The sinful passion is something that transgresses the commandment of God. And the other isn't right. For instance, to have a passion for music – it isn't a transgression of the law of God, but it isn't good.

Question: Why?

Father Pavlos: Because it is extreme. When one eats to the extreme...he will get sick! (laughter)

Question: Where then should our excessive love be?

Father Pavlos: Our love is where God wishes it. Does God want a particular thing? That which God wishes, that is where we must go to extremes, with much love. Is it possible that we often give our love to other things as a surrogate for spiritual life, to

fill the void within us because we don't love God as we should? Yes, yes, many times, yes. We have a lot of love in America for pets, for instance. Yes. Or a mother can love her child excessively, with passion – that is damaging. Not only does it not help the child, it can hurt him when love is pathologic.

Question: Why don't we give our love to God as we should? What makes us prefer to give it elsewhere?

Father Pavlos: Because – what did you say previously? – other things have taken the place that God should occupy. Those things are easier. Also, they please the emotions, or they please physically. Whereas, doing the will of God many times requires toil on our part, and pain, don't you see? Maybe we think we are not able to know God, or are not worthy. No, that's not it. The point is that our love for God is expressed with our keeping His commandments. And often those commandments seem heavy to us. Whereas, the other is easy, it's not heavy.

Question: Is it really a heavy thing for us to keep the commandments of God?

Father Pavlos: Many times, isn't it?

Question: But doesn't Christ say, "My yoke is easy and My burden is light?"

Father Pavlos: It becomes light with the Grace of God. When a person has the will and decides to do that which God wills, saying, "Whether it is easy or difficult, I will do it." – then it becomes easy. The airplane, in order to overcome the earth's gravity, in the beginning at take-off, puts out all its power in order to life off the ground. And then, once it achieves altitude, it goes more easily, you see? It's the same thing for a person. In order to escape the pull which sin has, to put off the weight which is pressing him down, requires strength, much strength, and decision and will. It's not an easy thing. In America, a viewpoint is circulating that we cannot come to know God. Many people say they believe in a "higher power" that exists but that they cannot gain knowledge of. Certainly, we may not be able to understand God, because God is infinite, but we can have interaction with Him, communication with Him. With prayer, with the keeping of His commandments – these bring fellowship with Him, communication. God wants this. And it is easy.
